Planning a Funeral Mass (or a Mass of Remembrance) and Burial

When a loved one dies many things run through a person's mind and heart. There are also many practical things which need to be decided. The following information may be helpful to you when preparing for a loved one's death or for making preparations for a loved one's funeral.

1. Notify Gesu/St. Pius immediately by telephone or in person. The parish office number for Gesu is 419-531-1421 and the office number for St. Pius is 419-535-7672. Gesu is open Monday-Friday from 8am- 4:30pm and St Pius is open from 8:30 am - 3:00 pm. Please call us. Do not send an E-mail or other form of electronic communication.
2. We ask that you do not set a day or time for the Funeral Mass until you have spoken to a priest from the parish. The same applies if you would like to invite a guest priest to come and preside at the funeral Mass.
3. A funeral luncheon may be available but you must speak to the Parish Secretaries for availability.
4. The funeral rites of the Catholic Church normally include the following elements:
 - Vigil Prayer for the Deceased: A gathering the evening before the funeral for prayer: This normally takes the form of a brief scripture service which can be led by a lay person or member of the clergy. (If the relatives of the

deceased wish, the rosary or other devotional prayers may be recited at any time during the period of visitation, but the scripture service is recommended.)

- The Funeral Mass: Mass at the church with the family and friends of the deceased. The deceased's body (or the cremains) is brought to the church to be honored before burial. The deceased may lie in state in the church prior to the funeral Mass if the family wishes. If the deceased was cremated, you are welcome to display a photograph of the person near the deceased's cremains in the church.
- Commendation (Burial): Prayers at the grave site lead by a lay person or a member of the clergy.

Personalizing the Funeral Mass

Many opportunities exist for you to personalize the Funeral Mass according to prearranged wishes or according to consensus arrived by the surviving relatives and friends. The following points will help you to consider ways you can plan the Mass.

- **Selecting Scripture Readings for the Funeral Mass**

Here is a list of scriptural readings normally used at funeral Masses.

Usually there are three readings: One from the Old Testament, a second from the New Testament (Epistles), and the third, the Gospel reading proclaimed by the presiding priest or deacon. The Readings are prefaced by "A Reading from the Book of Wisdom, or A Reading from the First Letter of St. Paul to the Corinthians etc." The readings should be concluded with the statement: "The Word of the Lord." to which the congregation responds "Thanks be to God."

- **Music**

Ministers

You are welcome to invite members of your family and friends to serve in the following ways:

- Lector – reads the scripture reading(s) prior to the Gospel and the Prayers of the Faithful after the Gospel
- Altar Server – assists the priest during the funeral Mass
- Minister of Communion – Assists the priest in the distribution of Holy Communion during the

Funeral Mass

- Cantor/Psalmist – leads the Assembly in song/sings the responsorial psalm
- Placement of the Pall – a white garment is placed over the casket at the beginning of the funeral Mass (If relatives or friends do not wish to do this the funeral home staff will do it on your behalf.)
- Gift bearers – bring forward the bread and wine to the priest during the Mass

Eulogy

A eulogy is a testimony to the life of the deceased person by one related or who befriended the deceased.

We highly recommend that a eulogy/eulogies take place the evening before the funeral Mass at the funeral home when there is an intimate gathering time and when memories of the deceased are already naturally being shared. We do not recommend a eulogy/eulogies during the funeral Mass itself. If a eulogy is to be delivered, it is to take place before the Opening Hymn (beginning of the funeral Mass) Eulogies should be brief and written out prior to delivery as an assistance to the person offering it.

Cremation

The Catholic Church does allow the bodies of Christians to be cremated. The order of preferences of the Church is as follows:

- The body of the deceased is present at the church for the funeral Mass and cremation takes place after the funeral Mass. Burial or entombment of the deceased's ashes in a mausoleum takes place at a later time.
- The deceased ashes are brought to the church in a dignified urn and treated with the same respect as if the deceased's body was present. The deceased's ashes remain in the church during the funeral Mass (with a picture of the deceased displayed if the family wishes) and after the funeral Mass the ashes are taken for burial or entombment in a mausoleum.
- The deceased's ashes are buried or entombed in a mausoleum accompanied by the burial prayers of the church (led by a priest, deacon or lay minister) and a memorial Mass takes place in the church at a later date.

Catholic Burial Practices

Catholics are strongly encouraged to make arrangements for burial at a local Catholic cemetery. In Toledo both Calvary and Resurrection Cemeteries serve area Catholics.

Recent events have brought to the fore questions regarding the practice of the cremation of a body and burial at sea. A helpful summary of the Church's teaching on cremation may be found in the 1998 statement of the Bishops' Committee on the Liturgy, "Reflections on the Body, Cremation and Catholic Funeral Rites." "The Church's belief in the sacredness of the human body and the resurrection of the dead has traditionally found expression in the care taken to prepare the bodies of the deceased for burial."(OCF 411)

"This is the body once washed in baptism, anointed with the oil of salvation, and fed with the bread of life. This is the body whose hands clothed the poor and embraced the sorrowing. Indeed, the human body is so inextricably associated with the human person that it is hard to think of a human person apart from his or her body. Thus, the Church's reverence and care for the body grows out of a reverence and concern for the person whom the Church now commends to the care of God." (OCF 412)

Thus, while "cremation is now permitted, it does not enjoy the same value as burial of the body...The Church clearly prefers and urges that the body of the deceased be present for the funeral rites, since the presence of the human body better expresses the values which the Church affirms in its rites." (413) However, "when extraordinary circumstances make the cremation of a body the only feasible choice, pastoral sensitivity must be exercised by all who minister to the family of the deceased." (414)

The rites of burial for the cremated remains of a body may be found in the appendix to the Order of Christian Funerals. This appendix recommends that when cremation is chosen, the body be cremated after the Funeral, thus allowing for the presence of the body at the Funeral Mass. When pastoral circumstances require it, however, cremation and committal may take place even before the Funeral liturgy.

Any catechesis on the subject of cremation should emphasize that "the cremated remains of a body should be treated with the same respect given to the corporeal remains of a human body. This includes the use of a worthy vessel to contain the ashes, the manner in which they are carried, the care and

**attention to appropriate placement and transport, and the final disposition."
(416)**

While cremated remains may be buried in a grave, entombed in a mausoleum or columbarium or even buried at sea, "the practice of scattering cremated remains on the sea, from the air, or on the ground, or keeping cremated remains in the home of a relative or friend of the deceased are not the reverent disposition that the Church requires." (416)
